Each issue, two volumes in one year, comes in a printed (ISSN: 16925858) and electronic format (e-ISSN: 2216135X) (<u>http://ojs.uac.edu.co/index.php/encuentros/index</u>). The abstracts are in Portuguese, English, and Spanish. Each article is identified with a DOI number.

Open Access Policy

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General Aspects

Submission of Articles:

Articles should be submitted electronically to rencuentros@uac.edu.co. They should be double spaced, preferably in Microsoft Word. Formatting should be kept to the minimum. Articles should be between 5,000-8,000 words; commentary pieces between 2,000-4,000. Please, include a brief, two- or three-line author description, and an abstract in English and Spanish accompanied by 3-5 key words. Moreover, please attach to every submission a letter confirming that all authors have agreed to the submission, and that the article is not currently being considered for publication by any other print or electronic journal. Please, provide the following materials with the aforementioned: Complete name, nationality, educational level, current employment, recent publications, summary resume, employment affiliation, telephone, and e-mail address.

Publication Type

The Editorial Committee will accept articles whose topics are related to scientific research and technology, reflections, reviews, short articles, case reports, review of issues, translations, discussion papers not derived from research, literature reviews, and others (according to the National Bibliographic Index PUBLINDEX).

1. Article of Scientific and Technological Research: A document that presents, in detail, the original results of research projects. The structure generally used contains four main elements: introduction, methodology, results, and conclusions.

2. **Reflection articles**: A document that presents research results from an analytical, interpretive, or critical analysis on a specific topic, using original sources.

3. **Review article:** Documents that result from research, analysis, and that integrate research findings published or unpublished, on a field in science or technology, in order to account for the progress and development of trends. They are characterized by a careful review of the literature of at least 50 references.

Peer Review Process

<u>Encuentros</u> operates a strictly anonymous peer review process in which the reviewer's name is, on the one hand, withheld from the author, and, on the other, the author's name, withheld from the reviewer. Reviewers may, at their own discretion, opt to reveal their name to the author in their review, but our standard policy practice is for both identities to remain concealed. Each manuscript is reviewed by at least two referees. All submissions are reviewed as rapidly as possible, and an editorial decision is generally reached within 6 - 8 weeks of submission. Authors are welcome to make suggestions for relevant reviewers, confirming that there are no conflicts of interest (e.g., it would not be appropriate to nominate close colleagues, relatives, or persons with whom they have worked as supervisor/ supervisee).

Before publication, <u>Encuentros</u> requires the author, as the rights holder, to sign a Journal Contributor's Publishing Agreement. The <u>Encuentros</u> Journal Contributor's Publishing Agreement is an exclusive license agreement, which means that the author retains copyrights of the work, but it grants <u>Encuentros</u> the sole and exclusive right and license to publish for the duration of the full legal term of copyright.

Instructions for submitting articles

Any item proposed to be published in <u>Encuentros</u> should be structured as follows:

Articles must be between 5,000 and 8,000 words in length, including footnotes and references. It must Include a word count of the main article (the count including all notes and references), and it must be put in the same document as the abstract (see below). Articles of more than 8,000 words will not be accepted for the reviewing process, and will be returned to the author.

Two additional separate documents must be sent:

a) An abstract of up to 150 words, accompanied by up to five keywords, and a word count of the main article (the count including all notes and references)

b) Your full contact details (postal address, institutional affiliation, e-mail address) and a brief (no more than 100 word) biography.

Style Guide

Text should be thoroughly proof-read before submission. Text should be in Arial or Times New Roman, 12 point, justified throughout, and double-spaced.

For all publications, one of two manual styles is to be followed. Either the style of the American Psychological Association (APA), or the MLA Style (Modern Language Association).

References

The American Psychological Association (APA) citation style requires parentheses within the text, rather than footnotes or endnote page. The citation in the text provides information, usually the author's name and date of publication, which takes the reader to the entry of the bibliographic reference. Complete information about each source cited in the text is provided in a list called "references," located at the end of the report of the investigation.

Quotations of less than 40 words are incorporated into the text enclosed in quotation marks and the appropriate source (author name, year and page).

Quotations over 40 words are written out of the text, with indented blocks of five spaces to the right, or a tab. At the end of quotation, in parentheses, there should be the author's surname, year of publication, and number of pages. It is also possible to announce the quotation in the text, and then to end with the page number or year. At the author's discretion, it is possible to write the following elements: author surname, year and page number.

When the author's name is part of the narrative of the article, only the year of publication of the document cited in parentheses is included. Example: Jiménez Gómez, (1998).

If both, the author and publication dates are part of the narrative of the document, none should be enclosed in parentheses. Example: In 1998, Jiménez felt that expeditious route...

If there are two authors, both should be cited if they are referenced in the article. Example: Jiménez Gómez & Hernández (1998) or (Jiménez G. & Hernández, 1998)

When a document has more than two, but less than six authors, they all should be quoted the first time in the article. If the document needs to be re-quoted, only the first author's surname should be provided. It should be followed by the word or phrase et al. united through the symbol & in italics and a period at the end of et al. plus the year of publication. For example, Jimenez, Hernandez & Gutierrez (2009) determined that expeditious way to achieve ... (first time used). Jiménez & others (2009) determined that expeditious way to achieve ... or Jiménez et al. (2009) determined that expeditious way to achieve ... (Next citations).

When in doubt, the current APA manual should be consulted.

Last name, first name initials. (Year of publication). Document title in italics,. Retrieved month day, year, http://www. direcciónelectrónica. com
